Courtney Brown, mathematician, social scientist, teaches at the Department of Political Science at Emory University.

In Atlanta, Georgia. Independent of his work at the university is also a leading scholar on the subject of remote viewing as it is done using procedures that were developed by the US military and procedures that are derivative of those mythologies.

And I want to explain a little bit about the orientation of the talk which is These merger of Remove viewing discussions, how we do it, what we're doing.

And the idea of proof. Now remember, I teach at the university I teach statistics and nonlinear mathematics and a social science program, but I consider myself a mathematician as well as a social scientist.

So I use the word proof very carefully. A proof means something. It means you're not just using it as a metaphor.

You're actually showing evidence that's undeniable and absolutely you know, locked in as being true.

So what we have basically done at Farsight. Is 2 major things. The first has to do with remote viewing and that goes all the way back to the 1990, s up to the current time.

That's the main thing we do. But we always knew that at some point we would have to offer something on the lines of proof.

Not just that remote viewing is correct, that is true, but that the topics that we've often investigated are also true.

When we started doing remote viewing, it turned out that extraterrestrials were all over the place.

Once you start doing it, they just are there you find them all over the place and so that became a major theme of the stuff that we were doing.

We originally tried to keep the remote feeling stuff. More or less oriented towards proof of sigh functioning.

More realisper oriented towards this, you know, the mechanism by which to remove viewing phenomenon occurs.

But once you start applying it, you know, there was no escape from the extraterrestrial content.

So we always knew that we would have to eventually find some way to give the absolute proof. That's remote viewing led to something that was real.

And so if we were dealing with extraterrestrial content. People could always say it's just People were just imagining things and it's just they're calling it remote viewing and they're talking about extraterrestrials and You know, there's no evidence of the extra threshold being real.

Now the problem is exacerbated, of course, because with the government in a state of constant denial that the extraterrestrials are real.

Then you have a real problem of saying no the entire government and mainstream establishment and all the major news is just crazy, wrong, or lying.

And so you have that to go against as well when you're talking about the remote feeling stuff. So what happened?

It was a really amazing thing.

We had no way of proving that remote viewing self led to real extraterrestrial stuff. And so in 2,022 last year.

Panasonic came out with a new line of cameras called the GH 6. Panasonic lumics, GH 6.

And the difference with that was a relatively small camera DSLR type camera, but it was.

Portable and it could show at 120 frames a second in 4 K all of these things are important And also it allowed us to shoot in infrared once we sent the camera out to be modified.

And then transformed, transformed into a full spectrum camera. Which does by the way avoid the warranty but nonetheless transform it into a full spectrum camera And then we could apply ultraviolet or infrared filters to the lenses afterwards to be able to Dial in to the bandwidth that we wanted.

So cameras are normally a basic, they're normally associated with the visible light. And on top of the sensor.

There is a piece of glass that is a filter and you never know it. You can't really see it, but on top of the sensor, this piece of glass And that glass filters out all infrared and ultraviolet. So you only get the visible light when you take a picture.

And normally when you take a picture that's what you want. You want the visible light. So you don't want the infrared and you don't want the ultraviolet because that would just fog up and fuzzy up the picture.

But when you're dealing with infrared photography, you have to have the infrared and you don't want the infra, you don't want the ultraviolet.

So we were able to put certain filters on top of the lens that allowed us to dial into which band.

Of the infrared or the ultraviolet that we wanted. So we started taking videos of The sky.

After December of last year, December, 2,022. Now this is something that's interesting.

You can ask all types of interesting questions about it. I'm not sure I have the answer, but someone came to us.

He was a lead traffic controller and a whole bunch of major airports across the country including the Washington DC airport, the Reagan airport, the Internet Washington International, the big one.

And he had like decades of experience as an air traffic controller in the busiest airports, including Washington, DC, which is the most highly protected airspace on the planet.

Well, on his own ticket, his name is Lincoln Loudsbury. On his own ticket, meaning he bought the ticket, he flew in to Elen and came to our studio.

And gave us a presentation. The presentation had PowerPoints, it had Excel spreadsheets, it had video examples that had everything.

On how to take video recordings of Exeter industrial spacecraft put to right over our heads. And we said, what?

And first of all, who was sort of wild like. This was not like he just walked across the street and Said, hey, this is sort of cool.

Look what I did. It was a full blown presentation from the lead traffic air, air traffic controller and on the entire country.

And he's also, he's published in aviation journals and he's also, been an advisor for the FAA and on and on it goes.

He's a big shot. He was a big guy. And he was in our studio. The very same studio I'm recording right that I'm doing this with.

Showing us these examples of UFOs that he took over Washington over his house, basically. And they were amazing and they were taken with his cellphone.

Which he, which he, Converted, it was actually brilliant. He converted it his cell phone into a very crude infrared camera.

And I guess he brought that to us because he wanted to show us how this can be done. You know those movie glasses that you see.

In 3D movies where one is red and one is blue And you see, 3D? Well, he cut the 2 lenses out, the 2 things with her scissors, and he stapled them on top of each other.

So the red and the bluer are together. And he taped this thing to the back of his car of his cellphone right over the camera lens.

What it basically did is the red and the blue together as you can see blocks out all light. But visible light.

But the red lets in some of the ultraviolet. So what happens is the camera For a cell phone goes bonkers and says it just says it's not enough light so it cranks up the automatic gain control for the light in the camera.

And inadvertently. It lets in some infrared light. And that was enough. And he was then taking pictures of UFOs and displaying them on our screen.

We have lots of big screens here and the studio. And he was literally showing the stuff on the screens.

And. And then he said, but the best camera to use is a Panasonic GH 6 and you get it converted at this company called Life Pixel.

He literally told us every step along the way. Now we had been using Panasonic cameras. We didn't yet convert over to the JH 6.

They had just come out. But we said, okay, we'll do it. So we bought some GH 6 cameras.

We had to first get the money to do it. We took the money, bought some cameras. We sent them out to Life Pixel to be converted to full frame cameras.

And at first I just took them out there and I pointed at the sky. But I didn't do what he said, I said, I know cameras, we have basically a.

Movie business. I'll explain the business side of what we do. In a minute but we I thought I knew better, so we recorded it in what we call V-LOG and I put some fancy stuff in there.

Couldn't see a thing. We also had visible light cameras going at the same time. Couldn't see a thing.

And then my son, Aziz Brown. He was talking to me. He was in Asia at the time.

And he said, Dad, what you need to do is follow exactly what Lincoln Loudsbury said to do.

Don't change anything. I said, okay, so we took the cameras. We put them out, we had them pointed just the way he said with the top of the camera facing noise north but the front of the camera facing straight up And we recorded not with V-lug or monochrome or anything, fence, any fancy settings, recorded in standard.

Standard normal video. With which is what Lincoln told us to do. And then, we, recorded it in fourk.

And I'll explain why that's important. Shooting wide so we got almost the entire sky and we shot for about between 10 and 15 min.

And then I was just sort of skeptical. I was looking up at this guy. There was nothing up there.

I didn't see anything. And then we took the footage, we took the cameras down, I took the clip the little chip, the memory card from out of the camera and put it into our computer.

Loaded it up and put it into Adobe Premier and whoa. And like 1012 min of video we had at least 30 UFOs.

Right over my house and then they weren't like little dots. Some of them were big. They were swooping in.

They were doing all sorts of things. And we had another visible light camera going at the same time. It didn't see a thing.

They were all using stealth tech. They all knew they were hiding. And then we sent the footage out to Lincoln Lonesbury.

I mean, after all, that's his job. He looks at things in the sky. And, here.

Hey, Gave us the estimates for the speeds for all these things, given everything that we're looking at and he knew everything.

He had to know the direction that the camera was facing. Where the top of the camera is, we had some software running called flight radar.

24 if he was able to keep track of all other aircraft than the sky. And the UFOs that we were capturing, they, some of them were metal, some of them were cigar shapes, some of them were rotating and circular and they were He basically estimated most of them to be traveling over 20,000 miles an hour, which is about 32,000 kilometers an hour.

Now you can have the Titanic fly right over your house but if it's going at 20,000 miles an hour you're not going to see anything.

So the issue is twofold. They were all using some type of stealth tech where you could not see them unless you shot an infrared And then you had to apply certain effects.

So it's with and post processing and Adobe Premiere that actually had them pop out.

And then you had to shoot it a hundred 20 frames a second and then when you were analyzing the footage since they're going so crap so fast 20,000 miles an hour you couldn't see them even in the regular footage unless you slowed it down.

And then you slow it down and then you saw them. It was like. The curtain road and you said my first reaction was and I've been setting the extraterrestrials for a long time.

Like some decades and my first reaction was my jaw just dropped on the ground what that's over my house I mean, it was unambiguous, it was right there.

And so what we then did was say, okay, what we're going to do now. Starting in January of this year.

We started finally the the the next stage of what we were doing at far site. So the first thing we did it was to develop our remote viewing stuff.

Second thing we did was to offer the extraterrestrial proof that they exist. And we started to get all types of video footage every time we went out on demand.

Of these UFOs. But we started to tell people how to do it. It wasn't that we were saying, believe me, I did this.

This is good. Just trust me. We're saying, it's fine if you don't trust me.

But this is what we got and this is the camera, this is the settings, this is the process.

We want you to go out and replicate it. If you don't believe it, that's fine.

Just get yourself a camera, do it yourself, you'll see. So the debunkers who are like cockroaches.

They come out the wood work, you know, as soon as you offer evidence of UFOs and they say, I was Photoshop, it was a glitch.

It was a smudge. It was this, it was that. So he said, okay, say whatever you want.

Just go by yourself a camera. Use these settings. Do this, get it converted, send it to that, to that's place to get it converted and so on like that.

And do it yourself because the debunkers can't debunk you if you took the photos. And if people start doing that, then it's a big thing.

So, well, let me get back to sort of the basics now I am of course Courtney Brown but I'm the director of Farsight.

Now far sight is 2 things. FAR S IG HT. First we're a nonprofit, IRS approved educational and research institute.

That's one part of it. And that part of it has got a, the, the name the Farsight Institute.

The exact corporate name is Farsite Research, Inc. Okay, now we also have far sight. Far site is a for-profit movie company.

And so what we what we did in the very beginning We found that when we wanted to talk about what we were doing and discovering and investigating with regard to remote viewing.

We would have to be invited onto other people's late night radio shows or whatever And we found out that they could lie about us afterwards.

They could do all types of things that were not right. And they controlled the mic. So if you get them content, you could end up You know, really regretting that you gave them content because they miss they views and misuse.

This happens all the time and it happens with mainstream. News outlets as well as happens with just people that invite you on their late night radio talk show.

And they control the mic so well we realize is that we have to have our own ability to show people what we do.

We have to have our own stuff. And that, that, that started a long. A period of development as far as that going back to the late 1990.

Terms of web web development but then also audio and then video so that we actually Not only controlled the old mic, but we could make our own booze, work our own movies.

And we're not talking home movies, we're talking movies that are pretty much on a par with Hollywood.

We're talking really good cameras and knowing how to use the cameras, the absolute best to editing software, stated the art computing capabilities, the whole works.

And that took a long while for us to get that in that in order. But we did that. And at first we started to sell our movies on Vimio.

But that was like weird because you put out a movie and for a month or 2 you earn a few \$1,000 and We had to pay our remote yours, so That was one thing.

And then, a Vimeo came to us and said, you know, you're not doing it right.

You should be having a streaming service. This is some years back. And we said a streaming service what and finally my son told me no Ted, they, Aziz Brown is my son.

He said, no, there, Vimeo is correct. We should be doing this as a streaming service and having monthly content.

And I said, but we always just make a movie and it takes a few months for us to get another movie out.

And he said, no, no, we have to do the streaming service. So I take his advice.

You know, man's got to know his limitations and sometimes I don't know. What's best?

So I called up Vimeo and I said, okay, talk to us. And they told us the whole thing.

And it turns out that their streaming service stuff is really at the top of the line. The bear, most of the very best streaming services are done by Vimio.

And they They, I don't wanna mention the names of those, but their household names that are just perfect.

And the quality of the streaming service is exactly is totally totally equivalent to and I don't know what these other companies use.

They may have their own servers or whatever, but the equality is totally equivalent to, they may have their own servers or whatever, but the quality is totally equivalent to Hulu, Netflix, Dizzy, Brahma, plus, So it's really good.

And then we transformed further as we developed our movie stuff. Into being a remote viewing movie business but also now because we know how to use the cameras Also showing the evidence of the real extraterrestrials their spacecraft themselves and our voltage our footage is way better than the crappy stuff that you get coming out of the military.

So like when they released the Tic Tack video, I mean it's foggy, fuzzy, stuff like that.

Our stuff is like really clear. I'll be showing you some of the stuff as examples. So that was sort of the bridging of the gap.

Between getting over the hump of saying the extraterrestrials are real because we can show that they're real and you don't even have to believe us.

We show you how to do it yourself. And then also showing our remote viewing stuff. Now, our remote feeling stuff has always been oriented around not holding anything back.

So we've always had videos out and printed material that show you our methods. The remote feeling was originally developed by the United States military and used for espionage purposes.

We don't like the military methods. That they were being that were started to be released. In the 19 nineties dealing with remote viewing they work and they're good but they just didn't do what we wanted to do.

So we changed them a lot. We evolved our own methods. And those methods are so complicated that we need pre printed templates in order to do it.

But remote feeling is a mental form of perception. And it is where the mind has visual images that come to you and You record those down in the old days we recorded them down on paper But we everybody at far site has iPads and so they all use.

Electronic means of doing their session. So. So with your physical eyes, you see this big pen.

And with the Big Pen, I can see the name, Pick on it. And I see the top of the pen and the point of the pen and so on like that.

Now if I take the pen away. And I say, now bring back the memory of me holding the pen.

And you can still see the pen in front of you in your memory. It's like overlaid on top of the visual stuff coming in through the eyes and the eye stuff.

They've the neurologists know now that the I's, the imagery is coming from the eye gets projected onto a layer of cells under the brain and that's how you actually see these things.

Well, the remembered image gets projected onto the same layer of cells. So, and I use the word projection lightly, but it's a layer of cells that the images go to.

Now remote, but if you if you look at your remembered image It's fog year, it's fuzzier, it's somewhat translucent.

It's not as bright and visual. As a as the physical image that came into the ocular apparatus of the eyes.

And so the remote viewing image is foggier than the remembered image. It's fuzzier than the remembered image.

They were calling her all types of negative stuff and I said well looks like I had a she wasn't a male old military guy.

And I went out and I found out about it and I found 2 companies that made them. It's an it's it's a very expensive \$6,000 piece of optical glass it's a huge thing of glass And glass if you look at it on the side of if you look at the side of glass like on the edge of the glass Glass looks green.

But that is green colours actually because there's iron impurities in the glass. So to get optical glass, all the iron impurities have to take out to be taken out.

So they have this \$6,000 huge piece of optical glass and lighting is around the edge and so what it does is it shines light into the glass.

From the edges and you and now the light has no way to escape. So the only way it can escape is if you use a mark or a special marker and draw on the glass, then light can come out where the marker is.

And so what it looks like is we have a studio where we have a I have a background in front and the behind me, but imagine a black background just totally black.

And then no light shining on the background but light shining on the person. And then they draw on the lightboard, which you don't see on camera.

And it looks like they're drawing in space and we had them dressed up in these black cat suits.

So that you can't see their clothing and then you see their face and their hands moving like they're on the twilight.

Zone, in space. Looks so great. And so that was way better than video. Recording them drawing on a piece of paper or on a whiteboard and it looked really professional.

And that was sort of great. And then we do the green screen stuff. Now, Princess, you know, later, She was, when I saw her as a model early on.

She was legally blind, meaning she was up there on this podium, absolute drop dead gorgeous in various type of very semi revealing costumes that had feathers all over the place and the photographer was zooming around her and the artists were sketching.

She was a she was a nude model, but she also did modeling with clothing. That was really exotic, bizarre type of clothing that looked like she came from a Hollywood Disney movie or something like that.

And, but she was legally blind so that she couldn't see her audience. So she could see sort of she could even drive but she had glasses that were way thicker than those old coke bottles that you used to buy back in the ancient days.

And that's the only way she could, and she could not read anything. Unless whatever you were trying to have her read was 3 inches away from her eyes.

That's the only way and she'd had to look at it letter by letter to see what was being written.

That's when I when I saw her so she was tremendously charismatic. She was, I mean, really, I.

She everyone sort of relied on her for her charisma. She was technically blind. And so she had the developer telepathy skills in order to survive.

And she couldn't see the people. That's the danger. So she developed over her lifetime.

Because you couldn't see well, she couldn't draw. So drawing on the drawing was not something she could do.

She didn't know how to draw. If you drew an airplane. The wings, you know, like you have an airplane.

Here's a few sludge here and the wings are sort of come out and taper off.

She would draw the wings reversed so they would be pointed, connected to the fuselage and then go wide out like that.

Because she never saw the airplane, so she didn't know really what they looked like. And she never had the coordinated skills to sort of draw like you do if you see from when you're a kid.

So her celebrity skills are phenomenal, but she couldn't see what she was doing. So we put her on green screen and she looked like she was doing amazing stuff on green screen.

So I took her into the vest ophthalmologist in the Southeast at the Emory Healthcare Facility, which is one of the largest most prestigious health care facilities on the planet Earth.

You have to zoom in. That means you cannot shoot in 1080 p. Video when it's broadcast out is broadcast in 10 ADP.

But you have to shoot 4 times bigger than that. Twice a horizontal twice the vertical.

And then crunch it down into 1080 p. So with that level of resolution. You can zoom in if you shoot it in 1080 p which is the way you're delivering it on a television and you zoom in it looks all fuzzy it looks crappy looks terrible it's no good So you have to shoot it wide angle.

In very high resolution 10 and in 4 K or better we sometimes shoot 5 K 4 K or better and then zoom in and post so that you can see clearly if the bug or the bird has wings.
