We have yet to receive a response to the first edition of the Nesletter from T. G. Hieronymus. He has two papers available entitled: "Another Form of Energy is Discovered That has Infinite Possibilities" and "Tracking the Astronouts in Apollo "11" (with Data from Apollo "8" Included)". At the Radionics Congress of April, 1975, in Indianapolis, Indiana, Rev Henry J. Nagorka read a paper entitled "Radionics, on the Threshold of Recognition" by Rho Sigma. The most salient feature of the paper concerned Biological Transmutation, that is, the ability of a plant to transport or transmute elements or chemicals not present in its environment. The transmutation of one element into another is the foundation of nuclear physics; yet I viewed my first encounter with biological transmutation with some suspicion. I have uncovered additional information in The Secret Power of Pyramids by Bill Scul and Ed Pettit, (@ 1975 by Fawcett Publications Inc., Greenwich, Conn., page 83/86.)

"In 1959 a French chemist, Louis C. Kervran, startled the field of chemistry with publication of his book, Biological Transmutations. Michel Abehsera writing in the forward to the Kervran text, provided some historical background.

- a) 1799, French chemist Vauquelin; "curious about quantity of lime present in chicken eggs and fecal matter....hen excreted five times more lime than it had eaten in the feed.
- b) 1822, Englishman Prout; systematically examined the increase of limestone inside an incubating chicken egg, proving that limestone is not contributed by the shell.
- c) 1831, Frenchman Cheubard; germinated watercress seeds in an insoluble dish with distilled water and verified that the young plants contained minerals that had not existed in the seeds. "

To secure the Kervran book, Biological Transmutations, I need to know the name of the publisher, date and place of publication. Also, any information on the experimental results of Prout, Cheubard, and Vauquelin, which may be in print. If you have the forgoing information or know where to obtain it, please let me know.

The enquiries in the following paragraphs are addressed to RHO SIGMA, author of "Radiesthesia: Science of Tomorrow?" Fate, December, 1965.

Prof. Dr. J. Walther, a geologist in Halle, Germany, undertook to evaluate 450 university students and their reactions over geophysical disturbances, commonly detected by sensitive dowzers. He found that about 10% of all students able to obtain a reaction with a dowsing rod showed increased blood pressure and a higher pulse rate over reaction areas.

- 1) With what university was Dr. Walther associated when the study was undertaken? What was the date of the study?
- 2) When and where were official or unofficial reports of the study published?
- 3) Does a similar reaction occur when a radionics instrument is adjusted (i.e.) pulse rate, blood pressure, brainwave changes etc)

One of the more prominent people using Tromp's techniques is Dr. Karl Beck, medical director of a children's hospital in Germany. Using only the scientifically unobjectionable results of EKG'S, he conducted extensive tests of patients over reaction zones and published his findings in 1959.

- 1) Name and location of the children's hospital.
- 2) Name and date of the journal in which his report appeared.

In Switzerland, the late Dr. Jenney, in collaboration with Prf. Steinmann, Dr. Wilhelmi and I. Oehler, investigated the influence of geophysical variations, commonly called earth rays, on plants, mice, and guinea pigs. The extent of these experiments becomes evident when one considers that 24,000 mice were observed over a period of seven years, clearly establishing definite cause and effect connections between plants and animals on one side and geophysical discontinuities on the other. Hundreds of carefully conducted experiments by geologists, biologists, physicists, and M.D.'s all led to the same conclusion: The actual existence of force-fields of a still unknown nature and the human body in reference to these force-fields.

- 1) Name, year, issue of publications in which reports by Dr. Jenney, Prf. Steinmann, Dr. Wilhelmi, and I. Oehler appeared.
- 2) With what universities or associations were these gentlemen affiliated?
- 3) What (and by whom conducted) have been the results of subsequent experiments?

T. G. HIERONYMUS has voiced his objections to the term "Radionics". His rationale for a change of terms is that the name radionics has a negative connotation in most people's minds. He has suggested the name "Nieonics". My personal feeling is that a change in terminology would be beneficial if and only if a corresponding change occurred in the experimental procedures and if the change was effected by someone recognized by the academic community. We should keep in mind that the invention and use of unfamiliar terminology is the fastest way to identify a quack organization.

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Dear Mr. Terrell:

Having received a copy of your Newsletter and read it thoroughly, I must say I'm hard put to unravel the skein of your queries. I could say that you'll find everything you need in my forthcoming book on Psionics/Radionics, titled MAGIC--SCIENCE OF THE FUTURE this winter by The New American Library (1301 Avenue of the Americas, New York, N.Y. 10019, for those who want advance copies. It'll be in paperback for about \$1.50 I believe).

But inasmuch as you give the title (Magic: Science of the Future?), page numbers (23-37) and name of the magazine (Analog Science Fiction/Fact) I'm surprised you didn't know the month and year the piece was published (it was the December, 1972 issue).

Okay, to answer your (1) question: it was not Dr. Morris K. Jessup who discovered life on other planets with a psionic device. Moreover, Dr. Jessup was a professional, not an "amateur" astronomer; please read pages 35 and 36 again. It was L. George Lawrence, head of the Ecola Institute in San Bernardino, California (see enclosed letter). If you'll take the trouble to check the article again you'll see that Dr. Jessup is dead (by his own hand, ostensibly--he is supposed to have committed suicide in 1959 in Fort Lauderdale, Florida).

(2) To (a), (b), (c) and (d), I suggest you talk to T. Galen Hieronymus, who told me about the interest of Bell Labs a few years ago. As for Western Electric and IT&T, I learned of their work at about the same time from three different sources, two executives from W.E. and IT&T and a scientist from the Rand Corp. In answer to (c) "strictly experimental," according to my last contact, and to (d), very exotic terminology, including such terms as "psychocybernetics."

and as for (3), Dr. Becker's team/discovered a possible explanation for a phenomenon that is probably outside his knowledge and beyond his specialized expertise. I suggest you reread that paragraph carefully. To answer (a) from John W. Campbell, Jr., (b) Oh, about 1968-70 (c) I don't know (d) Yes, many, many times (e) Yes, he's very much alive, and (f) Yes, I have one pertinent comment:

This business of conferring gratuitous doctorates on those who haven't earned them or want them may be misleading and/or harmful. Leonardo P. Corte, ~~whom~~ I know fairly well, is not a doctor, but a physicist. I got the impression when I spoke to him that he was not a Ph.D. or a Medical Doctor. I could be mistaken, but this should be checked before usage.

Then there's the matter of a very deep, basic and serious controversy (evidenced in para #4 of J. Gallimore's published letter to Leonardo Corte dated Aug., 19, 1975) in re "pest control." Be it noted that I have, over the past ten years or so (no, it has been almost fourteen, come to think of it) interviewed scores of people with first-hand knowledge and experience with psionics and radionics devices. Their combined, educated conclusion was unanimously that all living organisms could be influenced radionically, both positively and/or negatively from any known distance as long as the radionics operator had some "resonant point of contact" as a 'key.'

I know from talking to Mr. Corte that he disagrees with this. He's the only person I've met in over a decade of research who says this is impossible. My personal observation and experience is in direct contradiction of this conclusion. Right now, Mr. Carl Schleicher of Mankind Research Unlimited, Inc. is involved in a program of professional radionic insect control. For over two years I've been campaigning here in Maine for a method of proving publicly that radionic devices are capable of bringing the destructive Spruce budworm under control. I've talked to dozens of people in California, Arizona, Pennsylvania and New Jersey who have had very large pest (radionics) control programs in operation since the 1940s and 50s.

Moreover . . . there are even more exotic uses to which radionics may be applied: one particularly shattering experience (reported in complete detail in my forthcoming book) was the inadvertent mixing of the genetic material of several species of adult trees so that the resultant fruit for the next couple of years, according to my informant, was "a mishmash of pulpy nothing." This operator had (in order to speed up the stimulation of the life fields of the trees) placed the negatives of four different trees one atop the other on the collector plate of her psionic device in Harrisburg. ~~Kath~~ Her husband and a former high-ranking military officer (both of whom were highly-respected experimenters and pioneers in practical radionics and well-known for their work) confirmed that the story actually happened as told.


So you see there are different views, probably based on differing philosophies, the wrong one of which has no place in any serious search for real facts. What is needed here is not so much an American group of radionics aficionados and enthusiasts who will support and applaud anything said in favor of psionics, but a dedicated association of factfinders and truth seekers willing to make crucial tests and equally willing to report the facts accurately even when said facts are not entirely favorable.

That's the true spirit of science. If Mr. Gallimore is serious about his statements in the first four paragraphs of page 4 in his letter to Mr. Corte, then I'm sure we'll have little difficulty in obtaining a majority vote for an open, crucial test of radionics sometime during his proposed Congress of April, 1976.

Now that I've answered--to the best of my ability--the questions you've put to me in this Newsletter, I request the same courtesy: I have a list of questions I would like very much to have you print in the next Newsletter with Mr. Gallimore's responses.

This is the sort of thing I like most about democratic organizations--- full public disclosure of all the workings in a democratically-elected body.
